AS A MEMBER OF THE BISHOP GEORGE AHR HIGH SCHOOL CHAPTER OF AMNESTY INTERNATIONAL. I AM ~~DEARLY~~ CONCERNED ABOUT THE VIOLATION OF ANYONE'S HUMAN RIGHTS. 1992 IS BEING MARKED IN A NUMBER OF COUNTRIES AS THE 500TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE ARRIVAL OF EUROPEANS ON THE CONTINENT. IT THEREFORE SEEMS A PARTICULARLY APPROPRIATE TIME TO HIGHLIGHT CONCERN WITH RESPECT TO UNRESOLVED HUMAN RIGHTS VIOLATIONS AGAINST INDIGENOUS PEOPLES OF WHAT IS NOW CALLED THE AMERICAS, INCLUDING THE CASE OF NELSON VLADIMIRO CURINIR LINCOUED, A 22 YEAR-OLD MAPUCHE INDIAN WHO ON OCTOBER 5, 1973 DISAPPEARED ONLY TO BE FOUND ON THE BANKS OF THE RIVER CAUTIN IN 1973. MY CONCERN FOR THESE MURDERS WILL NOT DIMINISH WHEN 1992 IS OVER.

ALSO, I EXPRESS GREAT CONCERN ABOUT THE EXTRAJUDICIAL EXECUTIONS OF NELSON VLADIMIRO CURINIR LINCOUED IN 1973. I WELCOME THE INVESTIGATIONS INTO HIS KILLING AND EXPRESS THE HOPE THAT THE FULL TRUTH WILL EMERGE AND THAT THOSE RESPONSIBLE FOR THIS DEATH WILL BE BROUGHT TO JUSTICE. AMNESTY INTERNATIONAL BELIEVES THIS MUST HAPPEN WITH RESPECT TO THIS AND ALL HUMAN RIGHTS VIOLATIONS COMMITTED IN CHILE IN ORDER TO PREVENT SUCH ATROCITIES FROM RECURRING. IN ADDITION, AMNESTY INT'L BELIEVES THAT THE AMNESTY LAW OF 1978 CONSTITUTES AN OBSTACLE TO CLARIFYING PAST ABUSES AND PREVENTING THEIR RECURRANCE AND THAT THE LAW SHOULD THEREFORE BE REPEALED.
