I therefore wish to encourage you to use your power of clemency and commute the death sentence against Mario González Quispe, René Laíncos Aguilas and Liberat Fausto Mamani Morales.

As a member of the Human Rights organisation Amnesty International I support its total opposition to the death penalty, I would also like to stress that my interest in Human Rights is in no way politically partisan.

More than 40% of all countries worldwide have now abolished the death penalty and I encourage you to take measures to abolish the death penalty in Chile to bring your country in line with the worldwide trend. This would ensure a long-term respect for human rights of all peoples, the death penalty clearly violates basic human rights.

I urge you once again to take all possible measures in your power to ensure the above.

I would be grateful for your consideration to call for the total abolition of the death penalty in Chile which would seem appropriate. In addition, it would ensure long-term respect for the human rights of all peoples, regardless of nationality, which the death penalty clearly violates.
