I am writing as a member of Amnesty International to express grave concern about the extrajudicial execution of **NELSON CURINIR** in 1973. According to my information **NELSON** was arrested on October 5, 1973 by an armed group of men in air force uniforms. His family never saw him again.

Although his relatives were unsuccessful in attempts to locate him, they were assured by officials that he was in detention and that he would be released shortly.

In 1990 a Mapuche Indian came forward to say that **NELSON'S** body had been found and that he had been buried as "NN" (name unknown). The National Commission of Truth and Rconciliation presented **NELSON'S** case to a civilian court for investigation in 1990. On the orders of the court the body was exhumed and identified by his family. The autopsy report revealed that he had been shot in the back of the head.

A criminal complaint for homicide was presented to the courts in 1991. Those responsible for **NELSON'S** killing were covered by an amnesty law passed in Chile in 1978 for all those who had been responsible for crimes committed during the state of seige imposed in the country between 1973 and 1978.

I welcome the investigations into **NELSON'S** killing and hope that those responsible will be brought to justice. I agree with Amnesty International's position, that this must happen with all human rights violations committed in Chile in order to prevent such atrocities from recurring. Amnesty International believes that the amnesty law of 1978 constitutes an obstacle to clarifying past abuses and preventing their recurrence and the law should be repealed.
